Secretaries Report

Planning is now well advanced for next year's reunion, with a detailed breakdown of confirmed and proposed activities. I have put together a comprehensive accommodation cost breakdown with various combination options. I have only focused on Mantra Resort accommodation and it would have been quite exhaustive to propose or recommend other accommodation options and pricing. For those that are looking for budget accommodation and caravan parks I have deliberately left that up to individuals to investigate and negotiate best prices.

Since the last newsletter we have seen the passing of 2 members Bill James & Howard Turner and the passing of Qld member Rick Watsons wife Lexie. In the case of Bill it was a tragic accident and our thoughts have been with his partner Annie. Howard appears to have suffered some medical event and again, our thoughts have been with Sandra over her loss. I spoke to Rick Watson recently who appears to be holding up as best as can be expected. Lexie had been suffering with poor health for some time. I am sure I speak for all association members and partners to say we share your grief. I have

been out of circulation for a few weeks so apologise if I have unintentionally missed the passing of any members or partners.

I mentioned in our last newsletter how wonderful it was to see the wives and partners of deceased members who attended our last reunion in Victoria. Whilst I have been thinking about this in light of the recent passing of 2 members, it was almost like a bolt of lightning that I got a call from one of our elder statesman (meaning he is older than me). He gave it to me straight that we should do more to encourage more partners of deceased members to attend our reunions. I would like members who have contact with deceased member partners to encourage them to join the association family and be part of our reunions.

Finally – Many members may already know that I have been in and out of Hospital for the last 2 weeks with health issues. After initially presenting myself to hospital for a heart attack it turned out my lymph nodes had swollen to 3 times their normal size and had pushed against my heart causing the attack. After many CT's, Ultra

Sounds and a biopsy (which involved major surgery) it confirmed I suffer with sarcoidosis.

Leading up to the diagnosis it was either going to be lymphoma or sarcoidosis. During the biopsy surgery it was also revealed that I have asbestos scarring on the lung which is benign. I am yet to start a treatment plan which should happen soon, but I am currently still not myself and have lost a fair bit of weight. For those of us who served on the Melbourne or the Sydney it is clear to me that there may be members who have asbestos exposure damage and may not even be aware of it.

The PET scan revealed I had up to 4% scarring of the lung. It was only confirmed as damage caused by asbestos when the surgeon got some very high definition photos of the scarring during the lung collapsing and biopsy process. There is no cure for sarcoidosis which effects the immune system, but there are treatments available to assist with living a normal life.

Treasurer Report

2016/17 has been a busy year to say the least. The anticipation of the Melbourne reunion took most of our efforts to make sure it was a success and I think it achieved that. The cost to host it was substantial and all of the tours and major functions were costed. Included in the year was the commitment for the association to be the main benefactor of the Band section of the museum. This started with us taking on the task of procuring additional display cabinets to create a worthwhile display of our heritage.

From two display cabinets we were targeting 3 more at a subsidised cost (new they are in the \$8000 plus mark) through the efforts of WO Marty Grogan who had contacts in the display cabinet world. Well from our initial visit to Geelong where the cabinet company was located the museum negotiated 12 cabinets in groups of 4 for the museum. This finally gave the Band section in total 7

display cabinets plus a whole room as our display room.

It also significantly increased the museum's display area and the ability to display more currently archived material.

Why am I revealing this to you in our Treasurers report you might say. Well.....

From our financial report on the opposite page the most significant cost was the initial museum setup and acquisitions. The display that was officially opened by our president is ours and with future additions (from you) will be a significant attraction to the museum.

A lesson learnt in this year just gone was that raffles are not our forte. Though there was participation by the members (some were extraordinary) we only raised \$3,695.00 and with the 1st prize of \$3,000.00 (Won by John Karr who donated \$300 back to the cause) we

were left with around \$995 in the museum acquisition kitty.

Our other extraordinary costs was the concert. Our final attendance was extraordinary but our ticket price average was at the lower end (pensioner rates and groups) so our outlays for hire were slightly higher than the income. Again hindsight might have had us have higher ticket prices but could have limited our ability to get people on seats.

But all is not gloom, we finished the year off with a surge of subs and I thank members for their diligence in paying them. I will be issuing statements to those that have forgotten and look forward to having a successful 2017/18

I table our 2016/17 financial statement.



Melbourne Cricket Ground which was stunning success. He was an extremely talented pianist, flautist and piccolo player developing a great ability on the saxophone, being promoted through the ranks to Chief

Petty Officer Musician.

His easy going attitude brought him many friends and on leaving the service, he made his mark as a teacher whilst performing in many combo bands.

From his marriage to Sue, a WRAN who predeceased him, there were two

daughters, and although they did separate, they remained friends because of the children.

He was always present at Association functions in Perth and attended the bi-annual Band Reunion there in 2015.

His funeral in Fremantle was very well attended with a large group of be-medalled Association members hearing 5 eulogies, including one of very emotional

quality from his great friend Rob Himbury who flew in from New South Wales with wife Jan for the occasion.

He will be sadly missed, but never forgotten.

Twin Towns Services Club – Tweed Heads has been confirmed as the venue for our 25th Anniversary reunion on the weekend spanning the dates 25th 26th 27th & 28th of October 2018. Due to the enthusiasm shown by the participants & members and the success of the Veterans Band concert at our Frankston reunion we have included this in our 2018 reunion at Tweed Heads.

We have extended the reunion dates by one day to allow for the Veteran band to have a full day of uninterrupted rehearsal on the Thursday. This will free up Friday & Saturday to allow all members to be involved in a full range of unplanned & planned activities. At this stage we are in negotiation with Twin Towns to present the Gala Concert in the showroom at Twin Towns Services Club on the Sunday commencing at 2pm.

The Meet & Greet has been booked for Thursday evening in the VISIONS Room located in the Mantra Accommodation tower which is part of the Twin Towns Services Club complex. The AGM has been confirmed for 3pm on Friday in the ANZAC room behind the RSL Sub Branch office in the Mantra Tower. The Formal Dinner will also be held in the VISIONS room on Saturday night.

In the last newsletter I had proposed a whale watching tour which has been removed due to the lateness of the whale season and the closing of the Coolangatta operator. If we do have members who still wish to go Whale Watching “Whales in Paradise” which operates from Surfers Paradise comes with some very high recommendations. It would be up to individuals to organise this bearing in mind that you would have to travel some distance north to pick up the tour.

We are now proposing a Northern Rivers rainforest cruise on Friday with “Tweed Endeavour Cruises”. This tour de-

parts at 9:30am from the wharf complex at the end of Wharf St, which is on the same street as the club and within walking distance for the spritely members. 


The Admiral.

ONE OF A KIND

In the annals of the RAN Band Association, there are a number of unknown and untold stories. This is one of them.

Teenage years see a lot of boys begin their musical apprenticeships in bands, particularly of the brass nature, and at the age of 16, Bevan Pearce spent short period in a learners' band before being invited to join the Bunbury City Band, WA, to take over the BBb. Bass, an instrument previously played by his Father.

Members of the Band at that time included Kevin Foale, a well known performer in RAN Bands and another musician names John Cornell, who later gained fame as "Strop", Paul Hogan's offsider.

At the age of 19, like all others of his age, Bevan was conscripted for National Service and, being selected for the Navy, he reported to HMAS LEEUWIN in January 1956 for his allotted 6 months tour of duty. After initial training, all recruits were posted to the Perth-based corvettes HMAS FREMANTLE & JUNE for their sea training. As a Recruit Seaman on-board the former, Bevan was trained in gunnery and quartermaster's duties together with other Naval duties.

Sea time lasted from April to June during which period both ships sailed to the Monte Bello Islands where an atomic bomb had been exploded in 1952. This deployment was to make preparations for another atomic test, to be undertaken by British forces, assisted by the crews on-board the RAN ships. The Islands were still active with radiation from the previous test, but little consideration was given to the sailors being ashore carrying out prescribed duties, dressed in shorts and sandals.

The second explosion was in May 1956 in the presence of both FREMANTLE and JUNE. British scientists had been placed on-board both ships, all dressed in full protective gear, with the sailors dressed in No.8's, although they were allowed to roll their shirt sleeves down! One of the young officers on-board FREMANTLE at the time was Sub-Lt. Alan Beaumont, later to be promoted to Vice Admiral and Chief of Navy. When the detonation occurred, all crew members had their backs to the blast but were later told to face the Islands.

Discharged in 1956, Bevan returned to his civilian occupation with the West Australian Government Railways and a decade later was transferred to Perth where he was invited to join the Fremantle Port Division Navy Reserve Band in which he served for 12 years, establishing lifelong friendships with the late Graham Worth, Arthur Timms, Harry Goldsward, Ludwig Rietzenstein and many others.

During his last six years he was promoted to Leading Musician and assumed the position of Drum major. Following his RANR time, he joined the Army Reserve Band then under the direction of former Navy Band member Alan Kyrwood, only to be joined at later times by a further 8 ex-RANR musicians.

He spent 7 years in the Army Reserves, towards the end of which he joined The City of Perth, the oldest Brass Band in the State, later becoming Band President, during which tenure he had Bill Farrell appointed Bandmaster and then Director of Music, after convincing the strictly brass band committee of the importance of enlarging the 100 year old Band into two divisions, brass and concert.

Bevan's other achievements during his 20 year involvement with this

premier Band was to include women into the previously all-male Brass band, introduce a new uniform to reflect a modern image and most importantly, together with another ex-RANR musician, Bill Bell, and supported by Perth's Lord Mayor, lobbying the City Council to invest \$250,000.00 for the construction of a dedicated building in the iconic Queen's Gardens, adjacent to the WACA, expressly for the use of The City of Perth Bands.

Life Membership as awarded, but a move to Mandurah has all but severed all involvement with this excellent Band. Although no longer involved with community bands, Bevan maintains a keen interest in The RAN Band Association and the Australian ex-Services Atomic Survivors Association. Together with 3 other National Servicemen and supported by ex-SAS member and

Federal politician, Andrew Hastie, they recently had success gaining Commonwealth Government recognition of the serious effect the Monte Bello experience had on the medical condition of many sailors in the "Wills" intake at HMAS LEEUWIN in January 1956, resulting in "gold cards" being issued to all survivors. At least 26% of the intake have passed away with cancer and there are many others still suffering the after effects of their experience.

As already stated, this is the unknown – until now – story of "Bevan, the Bomb and Bands", the person involved being the only Association member to go through an atomic blast!

Thanks for asking me to contribute a profile to the magazine and inquiring as to how the WA band is going since the retirement of some of our members.

We are traveling along quite well over here in WA.

I do miss some of the old crew that you mentioned. We caught up with a few of them on ANZAC Day as Robbo

hosted a BBQ for old and new members of the RANBWA... Robbo treats me like a daughter and Andy, Ted, Phil Mander etc. are good pals of mine :)

Yes, I was at the reunion in 2015, a great night! ...remember we had a little trio playing - I was singing and by husband Brenton was on Bass and Tiana played the keys (she's married to Brian Horlock who I'm sure you'd know)... and then some of you guys played with us too :)

The RAN Band WA has been such a significant part of my life, it's hard to know where to begin in telling my story!

I joined the band in 1991 when I moved to Perth (from Albany in the South West of WA) to attend uni... I had been a naval cadet as a teenager and my unit, TS Vancouver, was the first cadet unit in Australia to have its own band (largely due to the efforts of

ex-RAN Band member Don Blair, who had been teaching me flute at school). I got to know the reserve band when they would come to Albany for events, so it seemed only natural for me to audition once I'd moved to Perth.

I have many wonderful memories of my early years with the band, in particular our tours to country WA, where we were always well received. In the 1990s we would regularly endure the 15+ hour bus trip to Exmouth, which was home to the American base Harold E. Holt. We would assist with their Independence Day celebrations as well as Australia Day events. In those days we were predominantly a concert and marching band, with big band and rock band ensembles used only occasionally. As time moved on, we ceased to perform as a concert band and I embraced my passion for singing with the Big Band!

The RAN Band WA has given me so much more than the gift of music. The band is my family and I even met my husband Brenton (a bassoon / bass guitar) player in the band. Apart from one year spent living in Malaysia, we have both remained involved in the band for all of this time.

I have had so many wonderful and sometimes quite extraordinary experiences during my time with the band. In 2003, I performed in a series of Tour De Force concerts in the Middle East Area of Operations with the RAN Band Sydney and Angry Anderson - Christmas in Baghdad was an amazing experience, especially for a reservist, and the experience earned me an Australian Active Service Medal!

Another notable experience was singing the national anthem at the AFL Len Hall Tribute Game on ANZAC Day, 2008. Traveling to Sydney for the International Fleet Review in 2013 was also unforgettable as we had the chance to spend time with and learn from all of the RAN Band detachments as well as bands from around the world and of course the RANB Association band too!

The interesting experiences keep coming and earlier this year I had the amazing experience of spending two weeks in New Zealand with the RNZN Band as part of the Tasman Scheme, an initiative that aims to promote reserve service as well as interoperability between the Australian and New Zealand defence forces.

Our family ties with the RAN Band WA seem likely to continue for a while yet - my son Kellan has recently been endorsed as a trumpet player in the RAN Band and will be heading off to recruit school in July!


